Public Inquiries- New policy amendment

Recently there have been a number of local Public Inquiries that have been needlessly postponed by purely technical objections that have been tabled at the start of the Inquiry. This has meant that often more than fifty people have been inconvenienced by the Inquiry being postponed and nothing achieved other than another date having to be set for the reconvened Inquiry. Often these tactics cause annoyance and can bring the movement into disrepute.

For these reasons the Officers reviewed the Society's policy and have agreed to make an amendment to our policy covering 'Changes to the Footpath Network'. The actual amendment is:-
"When considering any changes to the footpath network one overriding principle that will be adopted by the Society is one of reasonableness. While it may be reasonable to use technicalities and point out issues of omission (regarding requirements and schedules to legislation) at the early stages of the process, it is not reasonable to use such tactics at local Public Inquiries or at other methods of determining 'opposed orders'.

The Society will not proceed to a determination of an opposed order on the grounds of a pure technicality, it is in the public interest that the arguments be heard at a properly called Inquiry and it is counter productive to be seen to be arguing for something that merely postpones the Inquiry and the whole process. This is a waste of time, money and effort and would bring the Society into disrepute. Also, this extends to not supporting other Societies, bodies or individuals who adopt such tactics."

This change makes it clear that the Society will not adopt nor support the use of these technical tactics merely to postpone and thereby inconvenience interested parties who have attended in order for the substantive arguments to be heard and for the matter to be determined.

A Day in the Life of the Signpost Team

Thursday 11th of May was a typical day for the Signpost Team. Two tasks had been lined up in the Staffordshire Moorlands area for the attention of our contractor **Brian Taylor** and his gang of Volunteers.

Our first meeting place was north of Wetton Hill where we were going to plant Signpost 313, donated by our Inspectors **Frank and Brenda Wetton** in gratitude for 50 years of happy walking in

the Peak District. A technical fault was discovered and it was not possible to complete the planting on that day, but has since been rectified. We then had our lunch at Alstonefield, refreshed by liquid from The George, then processed to Ilam where we installed a replacement for Signpost 123, which had been damaged by animals over the last 50 years. We have received requests for several more signposts, which will take us, when completed, up to No 318. These are receiving attention.

The Signpost team has now taken delivery of a **CAT Scanner** (no, we don't know what the initials mean) but it's a kind of elaborate metal detector which will tell the operator when he is about to drive his spade into gas, electric or telephone services when fixing a post on the side of the road, providing greater safety for our workers.


Tubular Posts - September 2006


I am very pleased to report that four of the tubular posts which were in very poor condition have now been removed. They have been replaced by new wooden posts with traditional plates (Signposts 161, 176, and 177 & 178). This is very much thanks to **Ted Wolfe** and his team who erected the posts at the end of July. The signs are near Jenkin Chapel and Kettleshulme. Jenkin Chapel must surely qualify as the greatest concentration of Peak & Northern signs in the country, with three signs within 50 yards.

There are four plates in Taylor House which have been painted by **Bill Johnson** and will soon be attached to posts. These will be planted in due course. Another four plates have been finalised and are on order from the foundry, so they, too, will be rolled-out in due course. This leaves me with the task of visiting the remaining four or five signs that I know are tubular posts, together with visits to any other tubular posts that are reported by our members. **Neil Collie**

For Outsiders Everywhere

'For Outsiders Everywhere' is the dedication on Signpost 201 at Holcombe Moor. This signpost, near Ramsbottom, is an old tubular post due for replacement. Apparently this signpost, and signpost 202 at Arnfield, was adopted in 1985 by the BBC Radio Manchester programme 'The Outsiders'.

The Peak & Northern 1986 Annual Report states: 'We received some very welcome and useful publicity when **Clive Price** of "The Outsiders" programme on BBC Radio Manchester visited us whilst we were erecting their posts on the Arnfield site and made a recording which was later broadcast.'

The SCOUT MOOR (Bury/Rochdale) WIND FARM, opposed by the PNFS but granted planning permission, was in the news again recently.

Professor David Bellamy returned to lead a walk over the proposed site to the summit of Knowl Hill, three years after his last visit. His opinion remains the same: "Wind Farms on land are just not needed and cause huge environmental damage". The alternative is **Tidal Power**, generated by turbines beneath the sea, working 24 hours a day. On the west coast of Britain, with its vast tidal differences, we could generate enough electricity to more than supply the needs of this country." The campaign to save Scout Moor, which has held up progress on the wind farm for two years suffered a severe setback when a change in the law in favour of the developers, Peel Holdings, was passed in

July. **Edward Smethurst**, a local solicitor, had fought a battle for a judicial review to prevent the plans going ahead, on the grounds that the area is common land, protected as open space. But a new law, included in the Commons Act 2006, allows the Dept of the Environment to overturn objections and remove farmers' property rights. Peel Holdings have offered alternative land in exchange. Mr **Smethurst** has now withdrawn, faced with the probability of crippling legal costs if he were to continue. Work has now restarted on the site and the earth movers are back.

The powers contained within this new act are disturbing.

TEGG'S NOSE, Macclesfield. Volunteers wanted to help the disabled.

Cheshire County Council has asked for our help in running a new scheme to help disabled people to get about in the Tegg's Nose Country Park. The Council hopes to buy two off road mobility scooters, known as 'Trampers' for use by the handicapped to explore a trail round the old quarry in the park. The new scooters are able to cope with difficult terrain impassable for wheelchairs., but the trail will be developed sensitively so as not to spoil its attractions for other users. Volunteers are wanted to assist with manning the booking system from the Rangers' office. A LONELY CYCLIST

Wandering across the Derwent moors, heading for Lost Lad, we came across **Colin Wenham**, Peak Park Warden, with what appeared to be a unicycle but was a track measuring device known as a trundle wheel. He, and other Wardens, was working for a new organisation called **Moors for the Future**, a 4.7 million pound project funded by Lottery Heritage money with the aim of restoring the Peak District moors after the effects of fire, pollution and erosion - the biggest upland conservation project in Britain. Colin was making accurate measurements of the various paths in the area prior to the start of the Maintenance and restoration programme. The First Wallaby Walking Festival will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday 24th & 25th October 2006. There will be 5 organised walks, ranging from a 5-miler round Rudyard Lake or another round Tittesworth Reservoir to the more serious Three Shires Head (Three Shire Heads??—OS uses both) walk of 25 miles. He was active with the PNFS for many years and served as an Inspector for us as well as being a Peak Park Warden. He used to organise the Warden Guides Hot Pot at the Swan, New Mills, and his further services to his fellow walkers included walks and coach organiser and leader for Manchester RA and the Manchester Associates Rambling Club. The PNFS Signpost No 288, near Combs, was put up during his lifetime as a mark of respect for his services to those two clubs.

Another loss to the Society was the death of **Maureen Clapham**, a member with her husband, for 35 years.

PRESSING ON REGARDLESS BEYOND THE CALL OF DUTY

Extracts from an inspection report by **Sam Hackney** to the late **Derek Taylor**

"In my report on **Bradnop (Staffs) 16** on 10 June 1990 I said that the farmyard was ankle deep in wall to wall slurry. On 1 May 1992 I reported to you that the mud/slurry was much worse. I thought it would be prudent to wear Wellingtons without realising that they had developed splits. Consequently I was really in the s*** and had to drive home sockless. These were only fit for the dustbin.

After the recent hard frosts I thought today (10 February 1999) would be good for a return visit but I ended up driving home trouserless !!!! Upon entering the farmyard my feet went through the ice into standing water which was over ankle deep so straight off both feet wet again. (No wellies this time). This caused a lapse in concentration so instead of bearing south west on leaving the farmyard I carried on straight ahead, went over the fence, started to walk across what appeared to be level ground with a light covering of snow and went in to the top of the leg. As I tried to extract this leg the other one went in to the same depth. The place was deserted and I have to admit to momentarily

experiencing some panic. Anyway at that point I rather lost interest in carrying out any further inspection and could only think of a nice hot shower.

I had gone into what is presumably some kind of settling area for water/effluent. I must obviously check this out. Hopefully I shall manage to walk the full length of the path later in the year. "

The file does not record any further inspections of "Staffordshire Moorlands' most awful farmyard". If PNFS awarded a selfless determination medal, this inspector should surely have got it.

A.P.S. from SAM. (2006)

I thought it would be reasonably safe to carry out a re-inspection after the recent dry spell. How wrong can one be? I found about 95% of the farmyard to be covered in water of sufficient depth to provide swimming for some ducks. Exit from the yard is through a gate into an enclosure with free range pigs. Not the most pleasant of walking routes. There is nothing to indicate the direction of the path.



Frank Wetton, Inspector for Macclesfield Forest etc has been rewarded with a well-deserved success in his campaign to have two damaged stiles replaced. The stiles in question being at the ends of two concessionary paths across the neck of land between the A537 (Cat & Fiddle Road, but about 4 miles west of the pub and half a mile east of Walker Barn) and the minor road 300 yards to the south, now part of Cheshire Cycle Way.

Frank noted over the years the deterioration of the stiles and the eventual disappearance of one. He plugged away at all possible authorities over a period of months without even a hint of success until he stuck lucky with a contact with **Amy Rushton** and Cheshire's Rights of Way Improvement Plan. The plan is new and the County Council's favourite ewe lamb and Frank's appeal was just the sort of thing it was set up for. A wait of a few more months and lo! both stiles have been replaced, plus information boards alongside. Well done all concerned (but especially Frank).
